STAFF SPOTLIGHT Zuhoor Mehran

Zuhoor joined the MSC team in 2023 and serves as a Community Outreach Specialist with our Immigrant and Refugee Outreach and Community Education Program.

How does your program help the community?

We provide culturally and linguistically appropriate support to newly arrived refugees and immigrants. Clients often face significant challenges as they adjust to life in a new environment. My program plays a crucial role by connecting them to essential resources including housing assistance, employment, legal support, educational resources, clothing, and food resources to help them achieve self-sufficiency and successfully settle into their new environment. As households become more independent and engaged, they contribute to local economy, enrich cultural diversity, and foster stronger connections.

Is there a client experience that stands out to you?

I have had the privilege of supporting many clients but one that stands out is newly arrived refugee family. The mother has recently undergone ear surgery and lost her job, while her husband was actively seeking employment. I referred them to a local organization for rental assistance, helped them apply for energy assistance, and connected them to employment resources. As a result, they received three months of rental assistance, a credit on their electricity account and both the wife and husband secured jobs.

If you could only share one thing about your program what would it be?

This program is crucial for the successful integration of newly arrived refugees and immigrants into our community. Many of them left their home countries in search of better future and peaceful life.



What is the most satisfying aspect of your job?

Seeing the transformation of my clients' lives. Many arrive facing overwhelming challenges, financial hardship, and emotional stress. Being able to guide them through these difficulties, connecting them to vital resources and watch them grow more confident and independent is incredibly rewarding.

What motivates you to do this work?

Helping those in need of food, shelter, clothing, and employment is what truly motivates me to do this type of work. I never get tired because I know that every small effort I make can lead to a meaningful change in someone's life.

What do you enjoy doing when you aren't at work? I usually spend my free time with family and friends. I love exploring new places and hiking the beautiful trails of Washington.

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REMOVING BARRIERS

Helping more neighbors

MSC's mission is to increase equitable access to advocacy, opportunity, and well-being. One of the ways we do this is by removing as many barriers as possible so people can access the help they need. When we are able to remove barriers, the number of people we can serve increases dramatically.

Last fiscal year we were able to serve 111,736 individuals through our programs, representing an increase of 161 percent over just two years ago. While we know that need is growing, this increase can also be attributed to expanded flexibility in program requirements, outreach to specific communities that may have not been aware of or comfortable accessing our services previously, and providing additional options for people to access services such as online applications.

We continue to see diversity in those we serve. Twenty-five percent are under the age of 18 and 26 percent are over the age of 55. Fifty-six percent of our clients rent their homes, 32 percent own their homes, and 2 percent have identified as unhoused.

Of clients coming to the food bank, 70 percent identify as Black, Indigenious, or People of Color. In our economic opportunity programs such as housing, employment, and resource navigation, that percentage ranges from 63 to 92 percent.

These numbers reflect the power of intentional, equity-centered approaches to meet people where they are and ensure everyone has access to the support they deserve.

*Demographic stats are representative of programs where this information is collected from a majoirty of clients. To reduce barriers and for client confidentiality, not all programs require this information be reported.



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MSC & PSE

Partnering for Community

Multi-Service Center and Puget Sound Energy's partnership begin in 2002 to provide energy assistance benefits to PSE customers in South King County. Today, the PSE HELP program provides over \$24 million in annual direct benefits to clients in the form of credits on electricity and gas bills through MSC.

Since PSE introduced their Bill Discount Rate (BDR) program in 2023 and moved to self-attestation, allowing customers to complete the entire application process through their website, the number of people that MSC has been able to support with PSE HELP has skyrocketed. Prior to the program, MSC was providing energy assistance to around 9,000 households per year. The first year of online applications, MSC served 20,397 households, and this last fiscal year served 33,456 households with energy assistance

This dramatic increase is due to PSE removing barriers for people to access the assistance they need. Households are able to go to PSE's website and complete a simple application for assistance. Their online application is then sent to MSC where our team processes and does any required follow-up around eligibility, removing the need for clients to come to our office for an appointment for PSE HELP benefits.

In addition to making the application process more accessible, PSE also provides higher income eligibility requirements for households to qualify for assistance. For example under federal guidelines a family of four needs to have income under \$4,019 a month to qualify for LIHEAP but can earn up to \$10,096 a month and qualify for PSE HELP. This allows households that do not meet the federal income guidelines but may still be struggling to meet their monthly living costs eligible to receive energy assistance through PSE HELP.

"Both MSC and PSE believe in reducing barriers for people to access the opportunities they need and our continued partnership is a testament to our commitment to do so," shares Oksana Savolyuk, MSC's Energy Assistance Director. "We are honored to have a partner in our work like PSE who recognizes the importance of equitable access and supporting organizations like MSC who are working directly with our communities."

PSE's partnership with MSC extends beyond our energy assistance program. They have also provided grants to support our food bank and housing programs and sponsor MSC events like our upcoming MSC Helps Luncheon! Customers can apply directly for the BDR and PSE HELP program on PSE's website at PSE.com.
